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
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Slade Primary School Newsletter 2020/21 Term 5 Issue 3 / Friday 7 May 2021









Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope that you all remain safe, well and were able to make the most of the bank holiday weekend.

This week, following events that have been observed by the school team and in response to feedback from the school community I find it necessary to write today to remind you of some of the key measures that are in place to ensure everyone remains safe and well throughout the school day, particularly during drop off and pick up times.

Firstly, many thanks to those parents who notified me of the 'near-miss' that occurred outside of school yesterday afternoon. As a result, the local police have been contacted regarding the incident and I am in communication once again with the local traffic enforcement officers requesting their presence around school at the beginning and end of the school day. Please can I reiterate once again the importance of driving with due care and consideration around the school at these busy times. A reminder too that car parking is available at the Lower Castle Field Car Park next to the swimming pool and is **not** permitted on property owned by local residents. This includes opposite the school main entrance, the derelict pub car park in Stafford Road or the car park belonging to Bracketts Estate agents; thank you.

Thank you too for continuing to wear protective face masks at drop off and pick up times and for remaining socially distanced when queueing. A reminder that gathering at the school gate and otherwise coming onto the site without an appointment is strictly not allowed. Therefore please only arrive at the school gate within your allotted time and leave the vicinity of the school gate immediately after drop off or pick up, being mindful of others when waiting on pavements and footpaths allowing others to safely pass; thank you.

A reminder too that should your child develop one of the recognisable Covid symptoms, including a **high temperature**, they should not be sent to school and you should arrange for them to be tested as soon as possible, notifying us via the school office that this is their reason for absence. In addition, your child should self-isolate and not come to school if they:

Have coronavirus symptoms or have tested positive Live with someone who has symptoms or have tested positive

Are a close contact of someone who has tested positive

Out of school hours results of Covid test results should be reported to the school using the Covid email address: C19@slade.kent.sch.uk

Community Spirit: Children Leading the Way


Everyone at Slade is totally heartened when we hear of children at the school who are prepared to do positive things for the environment they live in and enjoy. As we reported last month, litter continued to be a danger to that environment and the animals and people who live and play within it. At that time, we highlighted the work being done by Paul - today, we are really delighted to share the story of Tobias and his sister Joni, who have set about cleaning up - and have enlisted the support of their friends and staff at Slade to help out.

Tobias told the newsletter about the action he has taken, leading to the creation of the Anti Litter Group:

'It all started on the M25 when me and my dad were driving and I noticed lots of rubbish next to me, so I asked my dad why there was so much rubbish on the side of the motorway. He said, "Some people, when they think no one is looking, just throw rubbish on the side of the road but sometimes rubbish just flies out of bins and ends up on the floor or on the motorway." When he told me about this I said, "I feel very sad and angry about this why are people doing this?"

Then it gave me the idea to start A.L.G. It stands for Anti Litter Group. Our goal is to clean up communities and hopefully the world. My mum gave me a litter grabber and I cleaned up some of Margate, Bromley and Tonbridge.

I drew a plan and that Monday I started the group. I got most of my class, Mr Duffin, Mrs Slade, Mrs Garrett and lots of other Teachers to join.'



We are delighted to say that the office staff have also signed up and we have begun to help our own environments by following the rules Tobias has written out to show the positive intentions of the A.L.G.

We are sure that Tobias is keen for as many people as possible to join, or to follow the lead and make a great start to securing a safe, clean environment for everyone to enjoy.

Nationally, this week has been Deaf Awareness Week. We are pleased and proud to have played our part at Slade throughout the week as our super students in Titan Class and the team behind their success in our Hearing Impaired Provision have taken centre stage.

Across the school, our classes have been learning all about deaf awareness, to complement the knowledge they already have and use after learning and playing alongside the children from Titans every day.

In addition, everyone has been contributing to a new display in school to celebrate deaf culture, through an artwork which will take pride of place in the office entrance area. As soon as this display has been completed, we will share pictures with you here and on our Twitter feed. The artwork concentrates on key words within the awareness that we have been learning this week:

Identity, Communication, Sign Language, Community, Deafness, Hearing Aids, Kindness, Unique, Inclusion, Expression, Visual, Acceptance, Equality, Patience







Sprite Class have been taking part in Deaf Awareness Week just like classes across the school.

In Year 2, the children completed a word search of the key words they have been learning using the British Sign Language alphabet.

They have continued to practice some sign language with their friends, this is in addition to the words and phrases they already use across Slade and in our assemblies.

They have also been carrying out artwork, which will be added to the special display going up in school to celebrate deaf culture and how we recognise that at Slade.

Deaf Awareness Week at Slade

We are so fortunate at Slade to be able to rely on lived experience when we plan how to communicate an awareness of the needs of the deaf and hearing impaired community to the rest of the school. Teaching Assistants Mrs Sturmey and Miss Havering have written their own accounts for the newsletter this week:

I am Mrs Sturmey, a Teaching Assistant at Slade.

I am Deaf.

When I was growing up I didn't know another person, other than my brother, who wore hearing aids. Being deaf has at times been hard but also wonderful, why? British Sign Language (BSL) is one of the most beautiful visual languages there is and now it is easier for anyone to learn it.

Deaf awareness week is more than being able to communicate with Deaf people, it is about how to support people with any form of a hearing loss. This past year has been challenging for many people, but people with a hearing loss that rely on seeing peoples faces and lips it has been incredibly hard.

I am lucky to have the best of two worlds, I have wonderful friends who are Deaf themselves and when we meet up I use BSL with them, I don't wear my hearing aids as I have no need to 'hear' them. Also I have wonderful hearing friends and work colleges who know how to include me in the conversations and support me when I am not able to fully understand what it being said.



I have been working at Slade Primary School for nearly 3 years now and I am proud to be part of a wonderful community that not only support Titans children (Hearing Impaired unit) but all children and promote equality for everyone.

What is Deaf Awareness Week?

Deaf Awareness Week is a national week of celebrating deafness.

Deaf Awareness Week is important to everyone because it encourages every individual to be aware of living with deafness and the challenges. Deaf people use sign language every day as it is their first language to communicate with others but they face barriers daily because not everything is accessible for them such as wearing masks as deaf people rely on lip reading. Also when train announcements are made and the deaf person cannot hear and needs information to be able to understand.



As a deaf person myself, I face challenges every day but I don't let it stop me. Being at Slade as a deaf TA has been wonderful but also challenging working with both deaf and hearing children. This is because it is important for me to understand what is being said but I always make sure the children are looking face to face to me or ask them to repeat what they say so I can understand them.

In Sprite Class every week myself and Mrs Martin teach the children different topics of sign language and it is amazing to see that the children are intrigued and involved in learning the language. We make it fun too where we ask the children to guess what sign has been signed to see if they remember and whether it is correct. They absolutely love it and it makes me feel so happy and proud of the children for learning the beauty of sign language.

All we ask is one thing: please take the time to read emails sent to you, we try to make sure that everything you are sent relates to your child, so nothing is irrelevant. COVID-19: If Your Child Shows Symptoms: Update





If your child shows symptoms of COVID-19 you should:

- Stay at home, do not attend any other place out of the household. This applies to everyone in the household. Telephone 111 if you require advice
- Get a COVID-19 test for the symptomatic person, via the gov.uk website, let us know you are taking a
 test
- If the test comes back with a positive result, inform school immediately so we can invoke suitable measures. This can be via email if out of office hours, during the weekend or in the holidays: <u>C19@slade.kent.sch.uk</u>

Any individual or group sent a 10 day self isolation notification should continue their home learning via the familiar Microsoft Teams page, accessible though the school website and Teams App.

Despite recent relaxations as part of the Government's roadmap, most COVID-19 restrictions are still in place in Tonbridge, the rest of Kent and across the whole of England.

Please make sure you are aware of the current regulations and laws to keep yourself and your family safe as well as respecting our request to maintain a 2 metre distance between yourself and other families when walking to and from school as well as wearing a face covering when waiting at the school gates.
